## **Budget Vote and Trustee Election**

Dear Neighbor,

The Pearl River Public Library remains dedicated to providing the best possible service, while holding the line on expenditures. The Library strives to fulfill its mission to "offer educational, recreational and cultural materials, exhibits and programs" for community residents of all ages.

Our community's library requires adequate funding to acquire new materials, to stay current technologically, and to provide educational and cultural programs that support lifelong learning. Appropriate funding is also needed for basic utilities and building maintenance.

The Library Board recognizes that this is again a difficult year to ask for an increase and has kept the request as low as possible. The proposed budget will allow the library to continue to offer personal service while remaining open and staffed the convenient hours that the community has come to expect.

On Tuesday, June 5, 2012 we are asking you to vote on the fiscal 2012-2013 Pearl River Public Library budget. This year's budget-to-budget increase is 1.99% with a projected total tax levy increase of 2.18%. This proposed levy is below the full amount of the Library's allowable tax levy cap increase after exemptions.

We expect that the Pearl River School District homeowner with the average property assessment of \$200,000 would see an approximately \$9 annual increase over last year—or just about  $75\phi$  per month.

The Library Budget Vote and Trustee Election will be held on Tuesday, June 5, from 9:00am to 9:00pm in the Library's Pearl River Room. We invite you to join us at the Public Budget Hearing and Candidates Night on Tuesday, May 29 at 7:30pm, immediately preceding the regular Library Trustee Board Meeting.

Throughout the spring the Pearl River community held a number of coordinated activities to honor the life of Paula Bohovesky. On April 23, 2012, the Library Board of Trustees passed the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Pearl River Public Library vote to approve that the Library Art Exhibit Wall Area will be named "The Paula Bohovesky Gallery" dedicated in memory of Pearl River High School student and Pearl River Public Library employee Paula Bohovesky who, on October 28, 1980, was tragically murdered while on her way home from work as a Library Page.

A small display of her very special art work will be on display at the Library through the end of June. A dedication ceremony is planned for Saturday, June 9 at 2:00pm, to be held in conjunction with the reception for our student artists.







#### Did You Know?

During Prohibition, there were three stills operating in Pearl River. One was raided by the police on a cold February day in the vicinity of Highland Avenue. The town's one man police force, Fred Kennedy, had to deputize Gus Gieger and taxi cab owner George Oakley to drive up to Highland Avenue as Kennedy did not have a car. They caught the bootlegger who was filling barrels from a vat of beer. The bootlegger's name is not known but he was turned over to state police.



Where Mel's Army and Navy store is today, on the corner of Franklin and William Street, were two notable homes. On the corner stood the home of an English woman, Mrs. Allcock, who ran a sandwich and tea room. Up from the corner was the home of Doctor Felter. These homes were demolished shortly after the Second World War to make room for the building Mel is in today.
